#### A VOYAGE FROM HOBART TOWN TO MELBOURNE IN 1860

Transcribed from the hand-written (in pencil) diary of my great great uncle.

#### April 1860

- 25th Sailed from Hobart Town on the Schooner 'Tamar' at 12 a.m. wind fair but light.
- 26th Calm during night and nearly got ashore. Off Cape Raoul about 3 pm with light head wind.
- 27th Rounded Cape Pillar during night. Off Maria Island about 2pm no wind.
- 28th Breeze freshened up from northward during night and continued. Sighted the "Hargraves" bound for Snowy River at 7 a.m. Off Schouten Island at 2 p.m. "Hargraves" to leeward no wind
- 29th Sunday Brig bound for Hobart Town passed us before daylight. "Tasmania" steamer passed us to windward of Schouten Island at 9 a.m. bound for Melbourne. Stiff breeze blowing from northward. Took in sail in afternoon and reefed topsail and mainsail. -
- 30th Blew very hard during night, made no headway. Stiff head wind all day, but sea down a little. Off St Patricks Head at 3 p.m. -

May

- 1st Blowing hard all night but made a little headway. Off St Georges' Rocks at 9 a.m. At 6 p.m. came to anchor under Swan Island. Strong head wind.
- 2nd Weighed anchor at turn of tide about midnight. Wind the same, and heavy sea running in the Straits. To windward of Goose Island at 9 a.m. wind increasing, and tide against us. Came to anchor under Hummock Island at 11 a.m. Went ashore for water but found none 5 p.m. blowing a gale. Let go the second anchor. -
- 3rd At 11 a.m. hove in the starboard anchor, no change of wind. In afternoon rained and blew harder.
- 4th Blew very hard all night but rode it out with one anchor down. Squally during day with sunshine occasionally
- 5th No change. Blowing as hard as before
- 6th Sunday. Hove up the anchor at 9 a.m. and set sail, but obliged to run to our anchorage again being unable to get away from the Island. Anchored at 1 p.m.
- 7th Got under weigh at 8 a.m. and tried the N.W. end of the Island but found too much sea running and a dangerous *part* to work the vessel. Ran back to our anchorage again.
- 8th Got under weigh again shortly after 7 a.m. and steered for the main land in hopes of a change of wind. Blowing the same from S.W. and heavy sea running. To windward of Goose Island at 10 a.m. Dropped anchor under Waterhouse Island at dusk

- 9th Went ashore and got two casks of water and two sheep. In the afternoon hove up anchor and went about a mile further up where we anchored in a more sheltered spot. Went ashore on Little Waterhouse Island and shot some rabbits. Wind about West and more moderate.
- 10th Blew very hard from westward all night obliged to give more cable and get the second anchor ready. lay there all day no change.
- 11th No change still at anchor
- 12th No change of wind, occasional showers of rain. About 3p.m., sighted a brig supposed to be the "Montezuma" bound for Hobart Town -
- 13th Sunday. Blew very hard all night but lulled towards morning. Hove up anchor a 10 a.m. and put out. Very heavy sea on and wind increased. no change..
- 14th Wind moderated through the night, and continued so throughout the day. Making some headway but no shift of wind.
- 15th Change of wind during night. Sighted Curtis Island about 8 a.m. light breeze with slight change
- 16th Wind about the same all night. Sighted Main land early. Breeze getting up. -Beating about all day. Sighted a steamer and barque. –
- 17th Wind very changeable all night. Arrived at Port Phillip Heads about 8 a.m., and when just entering a heavy squall took us which obliged us to let go top halyards, and lower the mainsail. Continued to blow a gale. Reefed topsail and mainsail. Steam tug arrived and towed us up to the wharf where we arrived about 2 p.m. blowing hard all the time.



# 'SECRET GOOGLE TRICKS FOR GENEALOGY THAT'LL HELP YOU FIND YOUR ANCESTORS

#### 1. Apply Quotation Marks

Also known as a string search this is one of the best, and most obvious ways, to limit search results in Google. When you type in a name like James Wilcox, Google will search the entire title and text of pages for those terms. They do not need to be related to each other – so you may turn up a page with James and Wilcox, but not necessarily a page where these terms appear together.

Use "James Wilcox" or "Wilcox, James" to limit results (remember that many genealogy related sites place the last name first). Also apply quotations around terms like "obituary" to make them exact — otherwise Google will substitute other words like 'death' or 'died.' This can be helpful in some situations, but for others is can be a big hassle and turn up many unwanted results

#### 2. Use the Minus Sign

Oftentimes when we are searching for ancestors, especially those with common names, we may find that a certain person or location we're NOT looking for turns up again and again, clouding our results. For instance, a James Wilcox who lived in Somerset keeps coming up for us. He's definitely not our guy, so we'll exclude the term Somerset.

Place a minus sign before a term to exclude these unwanted results (Example: "wilcox, james" 1837 mahala -somerset). The minus sign can be placed in front of many terms to further refine results (-dunbar -somerset -1907) or term strings (-"Wilcox, James Robinson"). Just make sure that the minus sign is placed directly before the term with no space in between. This works to exclude specific sites as well (-rootsweb).

#### 3. Get Site Specific Results

Would you like to get search results only for a specific website, such as FamilySearch? Use 'site:SITEURL' before a term or terms to do this. Example: site:familysearch.org "wilcox, james" –note that we didn't place a space between 'site:' and the url and that we didn't include the 'http://www' part either.

#### 4. Search Only Page Titles

When looking for a specific ancestor is can be very helpful to have the pages you turn up *only* be ones that focus on that individual alone. Or, when searching for a surname, to find articles centered around that specific last name. Making sure a search term appears in the title of the page is a good way to do this. This isn't always true of course, and you'll miss a lot of results this way, but when looking for discussions about a person, biographies or in-depth data it can be a very helpful trick.

To search *only* web page titles use 'allintitle:' Example: allintitle: "Wilcox, James." You can also search only the text, and exclude the titles, by using 'allintext:'

### 5. Search a Date Range

This is one of the best and most underused Google search tips for genealogists. This super cool trick lets you search multiple dates at one time without having to enter them individually. This is hugely helpful if you are looking for birth, marriage or death records (or any date based source) but don't know the exact date of an event.

Just add DATE..DATE to your search box to accomplish this (two periods in between the dates like this 1900..1910). For instance, we know that James Wilcox was most likely born between 1835 and 1839 based on the information we have, so we could search for "Wilcox, James" 1835..1839. This will bring up only pages that include one or all of the dates 1835, 1836, 1837, 1838 and 1839. It will not *exclude* pages that include other dates (which we usually would not want to do.) But if we did want to do that we could exclude any date by typing -DATE, such as -1840 after our other terms.

#### 6. Search for Terms Near Each Other

One of the most frustrating things about searching for ancestors in Google is that, while the engine will search an entire page for your terms, your terms may not have any association to each other. As mentioned early on in this article, that can cause major problems for

genealogists since many pages include long lists of dates and names. It is entirely possible, for example, to find the exact names, dates and other details you're looking for — but not in relation to each other in any way. For instance, our searches for James Wilcox and 1837 turned up pages that include James Wilcox and the date 1837, but that date was often applied to other people on the page.

However, there is a way to ask Google to find terms near each other! Enter AROUND(1) between terms to do this. An example would be: "James Wilcox" AROUND(10) 1837. That means we want Google to look for pages where the exact name James Wilcox appears within 10 words of the date 1837. You can change the modifying number to anything you want ("James Wilcox" AROUND(3) 1837 or "James Wilcox AROUND(1) Mahala) a lower number means a closer association and thus, usually, fewer results. We can also apply this to multiple terms (Example: "Wilcox, James" AROUND(10) Mahala AROUND(5) 1837). You will be blown away by how much this helps you find more relevant results.

#### Herdsman and Constable's Horse.

#### "THE RETORT 'CORTEOUS.'"

A good deal of langhter was occasioned at the council meeting of the shire of Phillip Island and Woolamai, when councillors received a report from Mr A. J. Walton, herdsman for the Phillip Island riding; who is also the rabbit inspector.

The officer reported that on April 20 he had impounded off the roads a horse supposed to belong to Constable Wilkins. He considered that his office of rabbit inspector gave him a permit to camp on Crown lands, but Constable Wilkins asked him for his permit to camp which he did not have. The constable then told him to shift his camp. He asked, "How long will you give me to shift, and the constable replied, "As long as it took you to impound my horse." The herdsman asked if a permit was necessary to forward same at once. He had shifted but would go back.

Amidst laughter, Cr McIlwraith suggested that the herdsman might shift camp when ranging.

camp when ranging. Mr Bonwick, secretary, said he wrote stating that in his opinion the herdsman had a permit as rabbit inspector to camp on Crown lands.

And when it comes to an overture on the shire hall piano one is irresistibly rominded of the pathetic notice posted in American drink saloons : " Do not shoot the 'pianist, he is doing his best." An effort should be made to obtain a new instrument, or at least to expend £5 in an endeavoar to resusticate the present moribund one

The Powlett Express. Friday 14 July 1916
