## LAUNCH OF THE SEARCHABLE DATABASE TO THE SHIRE OF PHILLIP ISLAND AND WOOLAMAI RATE BOOKS 1872 - 1900

What a great day! Monday 13 August saw the launch of our searchable database to the 1872-1900 Shire of Phillip Island and Woolamai rate books. Over 30 people attended, including representatives of other groups in the area covered by the rate books - the ridings of Phillip Island, Corinella and Woolamai.

The launch was the culmination of several years work which started with the digitization of the rate books from 1872 to 1928. Simon Eddy created a database program specifically for the rate books and this was followed by over 350 hours of data entry by Suzanne Hayes and hours of proof reading by members of our society.

Councillor Pamela Rothfield, Mayor of the Bass Coast Shire, pressed the "Search" button on the program front page to perform the first official search.

Old maps of the various areas were displayed around the room, and proved a great aid to finding the lots listed in the rate books. The data base has been described as 'very user friendly' by all those who have used it.



While the database covers the years 1872 to 1900, PDF versions of the years 1901 to 1928 are available for searching on our computers. Printed copies of the 1872 - 1908 rate books are also available in our rooms.

#### 150 YEARS

A large portion of Phillip Island, in Western Port Bay, will also be thrown open, perhaps as much of it as 7000 acres, in allotments, as surveyed, from 12 to 160 acres. Intending selectors will be glad to knew that the survey fees will be reduced, but to what extent we cannot say at present, as the amount has not yet been determined on.

The Age. Thursday 15 October 1868

I hear there is to be quite a rush to Phillip Island at the end of the month under the 42nd clause. This snug property has long remained under Mr M'Haffie's jurisdiction, and was admirably adapted for a squatting station. This gentleman-squatter for many years succeeded in getting the land withdrawn from sale, and his name, along with many others I could mention, has been regularly ticked off at the eve of elections as a safe vote for the M'Culloch party. Now a small inroad is to be made on the holding to the extent of some 7000 acres, which will provide for forty-three farms of 160 acres each. I learn between 30 and 40 selectors are preparing to engage a steamer to go down to be ready to peg out on the morning of the 2nd proximo. have not heard what arrangements are made by the department to reserve a village site, but I should imagine that will be attended to. Forty-three families engaged in farming-pursuits would form the framework of a township where the blacksmith, cirpenter, schoolmaster, and others would find a good opening. As the land is to be open everywhere on the same day, 1 do not see that there will be any great rush except to very favored localities. We cannot all go land selecting, or there will be nobody left in the workshops; but from the ercited talk I meet with in the city, I do expect a great exodus amongst those who, like the Athenians, are vastly pleased with anything new.

Phillip Island is mentioned as among the many spots likely to be rushed by the selectors under the 42nd elsuse. The island is decided by the lands department to be within thirty miles of some alleged gold workings behind Mount Martha, and all the surveyed land, amcunting to 7000 acres, will therefore be open for selection. A steamer is talked about to convey intending selectors to the scene of action, in order that they may peg out their allotments on the 1st prox.

#### PHILLIP ISLAND

Phillip Island, which was discovered 140 years ago, will celebrate its first decade as a municipality on Friday, when the presi-dent (Councillor W. Dawson Davie), Mrs. Dawson Davie, with the councillors and their wives, will entertain the ratepayers at a social evening in the shire hall at Cowes.

Invitations have been sent to all past councillors and also the Parliamentary representatives for Flinders and Mornington. It is expected that more than 350, will attend.

The shire secretary (Mr. E. R. Marchant) will be in charge of the arrangements Phillip Island was formerly a riding of the Shire of Phillip Island and Woolama:

#### PHILLIP ISLAND TRANSPORT.

#### Complaints of Channel Siltation.

The Minister for Public Works (Mr. Goudie) was asked by a deputation of members of the Phillip Island and Woolamai Shire Council and of the residents on the island yesterday to make arrangements to dredge the channel between Stony Point and the island. The deputation was introduced by the Minister for Lands (Mr. Downward).

It was stated that the steamer Genista. which plied between the mainland and the island, frequently had to "force a passage" through the silt in the bed of the channel.

The owner of the vessel, Mr. A. K. T. Sambell, said that under existing conditions it was impossible to maintain a regu-lar service to San Remo. The continual "scraping" to which the bottom of the ship was subjected involved heavy expenditure in repairs. He contemplated the purchase of a larger vessel, but could not hope to run it unless the channel were dredged.

Councillor T. McPhee said that resi-dents on the island had been trying for 37 years to have the channel deepened.

Mr. Goudie said that he did not know if it would be possible to dredge the chan-nel effectively, or if a dredge could be made available for the work. He promised to ask the chief engineer of the department to report on the subject.

#### "SOME ROAD,"

#### (TO THE EDITOR POWLETT EXPRESS)

Sir,—In a few sentences I would like to voice my impressions of district roads obtained on a run from Wonthaggi to San Remo. They were good until we got to Dudley; was told the mess up there was Country Roads Board doings. Barring crossings and culverts, road fair to old Powlett Post Office. The cockey living there is evidently an easy going cuss to allow them to root up the place; one has a vision of clouds of dust in a few weeks' time about there. Ti-tree on the road points to car troubles. Then a little fur-ther on we hum, "Who lives. here ?" Cr. Hollins. My ! don't I wish he lived all the way to San Bame We have Delevice "Who Remo. We pass Dalyston, "Who lives here ?" Cr. Daly. Don't believe it ; road too bad ! The driver is a good one; we dodge and span ruts innumerable, until we get to Kilcunda R. S. There was one place that tickled my fancy, where the road branches to Woolamai. Did the driver swear ? Don't know, it sounded awful. The water lies there, it does not know what else to do. Twelve months ago I saw them metalling the road at Bourne Creek ; at current bank rate of interest, the council would have been some pounds iu credit had they kept the money in the bank. The money has been put on the road to nobody's advantage, as the road is not blinded, few dare to use it. I was looking at the Kilcunda Hall, I heard some one say Council Chambers, when Biff ! I thought the car had collapsed, but no, it was only a crossing a foot wide and a foot deep. I did not remember much more till we reached Anderson. Then I heard a voice from somewhere saying, "It is alright now, you can lounge back; the engineer lives where we are going, and you'll see he is worth two or three councils." And it was sc
